## Undergraduate Student Transfers

There were 53 eligible undergraduate students enrolled in fall 2020 semester who did not re-enroll in the fall 2021 semester. Based on student self-report and/or university personnel knowledge, three (3) of these undergraduate students (6%) transferred to another institution of higher education.

### **Undergraduate Student Employment Upon Graduation**

Each year undergraduate students who are completing their programs are asked to complete an exit survey about their university experiences, perceptions, and current status. The response rate for undergraduates completing the survey during the 2021-2022 academic year was 56%. For undergraduates who earned their bachelor's degrees during the 2021-2022 academic year, 83% reported being employed. Of those employed, 73% reported being employed in their field or related field of study. In addition, 75% reported that they plan to continue their education.

Each year graduate students who are completing their programs are asked to complete an exit survey about their university experiences, perceptions, and current status. The response rate for graduate students completing the survey during the 2021-2022 academic year was 89%. For graduate students who earned their master's degrees during the 2021-2022 academic year, 82% reported being employed. Of those employed, 77% reported being employed in their field or related field of study. In addition, 44% reported they plan to continue their education.
