### Undergraduate Student Transfers

Martin University is required to report transfer-out rates to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) each year. The IPEDS definition of the transfer-out rates includes the percentage of first-time, full-time freshmen students enrolled in one fall semester who are known to have transferred out of the institution within 150% of normal time to completion. Martin University's transfer-out rates over the past three years are shown in the table below.

### **Undergraduate Student Employment Upon Graduation**

Each year, undergraduate students completing their programs are asked to complete an exit survey about their employment status. For undergraduates who earned their bachelor's degrees during the 2023-24 academic year, 84% reported being employed. Of those employed, 88% reported being employed in their field or related field of study. In addition, 79% reported that they plan to continue their education.

### **Graduate Student Employment Upon Graduation**

Each year graduate students completing their programs are asked to complete an exit survey about their university experiences, perceptions, and current status. The response rate for graduate students completing the survey during the 2023-24 academic year was 88%. For graduate students who earned their master's degrees during the 2023-2024 academic year, 71% reported being employed. Of those employed, 100% reported being employed in their field or related field of study. Of the unemployed students, 50% indicated they were not currently seeking employment. In addition, 57% reported they plan to continue their education.
